I think First U will be a wonderful teaching congregation for Chris. We have so much to offer. For me, personally, I am looking forward to my role as mentor. The ministerial mentors I had during my formation process were so important to who I am today. It is a joy to be able to start returning the favor.

Speaking of formation and mentorship, I am hoping you have already marked your calendars for June 19-23, 2013. I know that feels like a long way away, but it really is just around the corner. That is when the Unitarian Universalist General Assembly will be here in Louisville! Imagine 5000 UUs from around the country, gathering here for a week of learning, growing, decision making and being together! Make sure you plan ahead to attend the many workshops that will be offered. Plus, we will be electing a new moderator of our Association, so our governance and plenaries will be abuzz. Registration is free if you volunteer, and they will need LOTS of volunteers, so it is also a cheap way to learn more about this fascinating faith tradition of ours, and your place in it!

Spring buds lead to summer flowers. Metaphorically, and physically. Which reminds me: Our Flower Sharing Ceremony will be on Easter (April 8) this year! Though this is earlier than our usual tradition, I am confident that we will find plenty of spring flowers to bring in. Especially if this warm stretch keeps up.

There are several important events coming up in the month of April that involve participation from all ages. Please make sure to put these on your family calendar and participate in any or all. There is something for everyone!

**Coming of Age introductions** of youth and mentors have been scheduled during the month of April on two different dates during the Moment for All Ages, April 1 and April 15. These opportunities are important because they allow the youth to have a “practice” moment before the community in order to prepare for the CoA Celebration when they each have the chance to share their prepared statements of belief. Mark your calendars now for that special Celebration of May 13.

**Easter with its First U traditions** is coming next month too! The Senior High Youth will be having a sleep-over on Saturday, April 7 and will be getting up early to prepare a **Pancake Breakfast** for the entire church family and any visitors that might join the community on Easter morning. Serving of breakfast will begin at 9:30am with the price of the meal being by donation. Give generously and come hungry!

An **Easter Egg Hunt** will be held on Easter morning as well. The Middle School Youth Group is in charge of this event. Members of the church are

being asked to provide wrapped, peanut-free candies suitable for filling plastic eggs; remember than some children are allergic to nuts of all kinds and the desire is to provide a safe hunt with candies that honor the special needs of those who must take care with diet. # Notes from the Ministries

## MISSION AND OUTREACH

Local Unitarian Universalists were quick to step forward to help those affected by the March 2 storms in Kentucky and Indiana. The **March 4 offering** for Red Cross Disaster Relief **raised \$1200**, and individual First U congregants continued to donate money, time, and materials. Working through Unitarian Universalists for Social Justice ("UUSJ"), the collaboration among the three Louisville UU congregations, we donated supplies and coordinated relief efforts from as far away as Boca Raton, Florida. Considering the alarming frequency of natural disasters in recent years, the UUSJ may consider training a UU Disaster Response team.

March saw First supporting justice on many fronts in Frankfort and in Indianapolis. Through lobbying, emails, phone calls, and rallies, we addressed legislation affecting reproductive freedom, voting rights, bullying, immigration, sex education, and environmental affairs. Also in March, the success (in terms of both fund-raising and FUN-raising) of the Dancing With Our Partner Church event convinced us to make this an annual affair. Through several avenues, we worked for Help Ministries to achieve its goal of earning a matching gift. Thanks for your participation in all these efforts.

So what's coming up in April? Be ready for the Pride Parade and the Immigration Justice event this summer with your very own bright yellow "**Standing on the Side of Love**" t-shirt. Look for the Mission and Outreach table in the social hall after church to get in on the bulk order – save on shipping and make sure a small portion of your purchase price goes to social justice funding. We will place the full order on **April 15**, so act quickly. We are delighted that the three churches are joining together to sponsor a refugee family, and during April we will be soliciting donations of furnishings for our family's apartment. On April 7, we will gather at the church – while some of us go out to clean up our neighborhood as we participate in Operation Brightside, others will stay at church to sort and organize jewelry for the **April 22** Jewelry Sale (to benefit our Partner Church). On **April 27**, join us for "Hot Coffee," the first in a new UUSJ social justice film series. The film is at 6:30 at Clifton Universalist Unitarian Church, with a discussion afterwards of what can be done to preserve access to courts. On **April 29**, Mission and Outreach and Women's Alliance co-sponsor a Fifth Sunday Social Action Celebration of Life, when we will fill back to school backpacks for needy kids.

And as a final note, check out uulouisville.org and its new listing of social justice events at all three UU churches in Louisville. Thanks to John Cooley for making this possible.

## RESOURCE MINISTRY

**New Purchases!** Thanks to the "Solar Array Fund" under the watchful eye of Joe Kremer, we now have a new freezer in the kitchen and a refrigerator in the pre-school room. Our freezer "died," and the old refrigerator upstairs was not energy efficient. Joe states, "Any reputable solar panel sales person will tell you that before you buy solar, the first and best use of your money is to cut your electricity usage. We've done that by replacing many of our lights with CFL's, turning up the AC threshold, and now we have replaced 2 refrigerators and a freezer. We used the money from the Solar Array Fund because by doing so we require fewer solar panels to generate the electricity the church uses. The less electricity we use the fewer solar panels we will need. The freezer cost \$497, the refrigerator was \$437 --- both are Energy Star models." Thank You to Joe Kremer for his guidance and advice in these purchases. Thank You to members and friends who have enjoyed many spaghetti dinners--- donating money to this most worthy fund.

**Churchyard Friends**, under the direction of Carol Findling, did a Great Job cleaning up, sweeping, raking, trimming, and pulling weeds to make our church grounds shine! Churchyard Friends is open to anyone who would like to come in, usually on a Saturday morning, and participate in getting to know other member and friends, enjoy the great outdoors, and do a good deed for the church! **Kudos to Linda Parry and Kathy Thackeray** for their talents in working on our Church Banners! They did some fixing up of old banners, and made a few new ones. Very Appreciated. Thank You.

## Ministry Theme: Perfection

Perfection as being without flaw (aesthetically or in one's personality) is a mostly unattainable goal that at times has been either inspirational or oppressive (or both!) depending on one's perspective.

However, there are other ways to understand perfection. It can also mean having all of the required elements, qualities or characteristics – a much fuller, richer meaning of the word that could also be understood as complete, or whole.

Today, when looking at the concept of perfect as used in the Bible, the “without flaw” definition of perfect is often understood, but a better translation is actually “mature.”

### Reflection Questions:

- What is the difference between excellence and perfection?
- Which of these definitions most appeal to you (without flaw, whole, or mature)? Why?
- Do you find the idea of perfection as oppressive, as inspirational, both, or neither? Why?
- If you hold yourself, or others, to impossibly high standards, what would it be like to shift your understanding of perfect?
- Voltaire wrote “The perfect is the enemy of the good” when talking about the amount of effort it takes to accomplish something. What does he mean by this, and how do you see examples of it in your life?

### Rain Catching

This time of year brings plenty of rain. Mostly, that is a good thing - April showers bring May flowers, singing in the rain, spring peepers, etc. But, in the city and the suburbs, rain can cause problems for our waterways. When we build roofs and roads, we seal off the surface of the ground and stop the natural process of rainwater soaking into the soil. Instead, the water quickly runs over the surface, carrying litter, oil, bird droppings – anything that’s on the ground – right into the nearest storm drain and then to the nearest stream.

If you want to do something about this pollution problem, you don’t have to tear out your driveway or remove your roof. You can install a rain barrel (or two or three) on your home’s downspouts. This will allow you to use the water and keep it out of the storm sewer. Another approach is to install a rain garden in your yard. Think of a flower bed that, instead of being a mound of soil, is a dished-out low spot. Water collects in the rain garden during a storm and slowly soaks in over a period of hours. A good resource to learn more is the Louisville Metropolitan Sewer District (MSD) web site at <http://www.msdlouky.org/aboutmsd/rainbarrels.htm>.

Some other ways to help our waterways:

- (1) If you wash your car at home, do it on the lawn instead of the driveway (water and soap will soak into the ground)
- (2) If you live in the city where there are combined sewers, don’t use your washer when it’s raining so as to not overload the sewers
- (3) Reduce the use of fertilizer and pesticides on your lawn
- (4) Pick up after your pet
- (5) Don’t litter; better yet, pick up litter on your walks

Do what you can and feel good about it.

## A letter from our Partner Church

Dear Brothers From Louisville!

February according to folk customs is named the winter's last month. Years of experience had shown that in this month, winter is losing it's cold grip and the first flowers of spring, the snowdrops appear.

This year's February showed nothing of the beginning of spring, but temperatures of -4 Fahrenheit. As I write these lines there is a winter atmosphere outside. At night there are still 17.6 degrees and snow in our gardens.

On the 11th of February I held a marriage ceremony which is very rare in our Church and it influences baptisms. This marriage was between one of our Unitarian members and a Calvinist girl. For the groom according to old folk-custom I wrote a sort of "valedictory", in which he said thanks and goodbye to his family and friends before entering into marital life and also a "perimition" for the bride's family to get the bride. All of it in rhyming form. But I don't know the correct English translation for these old local customs.

In February I held services in other Unitarian and Calvinist Churches. It is a custom that reformed churches in the first 3 months of the year hold 'Week of Prayer for Christian Unity' services. On February the 18th I held service in Harangláb and Szőkefalva which are 62 miles far from Nagyenyed. On the 20th I was to a nearby village called Szentkirály and Tompaháza on the same day, to Calvinist Churches.

On the 21st I was also in 2 nearby Calvinist Churches in Csombord and Magyarbagó. These services have the goal of meeting and knowing each other's faith, and to develop tolerance towards other religions. I held these services in this faith.

On February the 26th we held our annual Church-meeting and elected the leading members for the next term, 2012-2014. Mostly we reelected former members due to lack of interest from other people. Also we decided that we will have our 'Week of Prayer for Christian Unity' between the 19th and 25th of March. We invited Calvinist and Unitarian ministers and a Catholic priest.

Our family set a date for the baptism of our nephew on the 28th of April in our Church and as a grandfather I will conduct the ceremony. We are hardly waiting for this big event!

## Circles Within Circles – Women's Alliance Retreat

April 13 and 14 – First Unitarian Church

At the Women's Alliance retreat women are invited to create circles of meditation, circles of singing and circles of community and feminist heritage. On Friday evening, April 13th from 6 - 10pm, we will come together in a circle of sisterhood to share a supper followed by a gathering and centering service and bonfire. Saturday, April 14th, activities will include workshops and catered luncheon.

There will be four workshops that will be scheduled at various times so that participants can decide how to balance their day between workshops and unstructured activities. Here are the workshop offerings:

- "Singing in the Sacred Circle" Shelley Graff, Presenter. "This 'playshop' is an opportunity to look into your sister's eyes and share voice and spirit through song. While learning affirming, short, repetitive women-centered and earth-based songs from a variety of traditions, (Goddess, Native American, Buddhist) power rises from the center of the circle as all voices create an energy that is personally empowering, loving, healing and transformative." After attending Shelley's "playshop" Carolyn McDade, composer of "Spirit of Life," states, "We are fortunate to have Shelley Graff among us. She is generous of heart and skill - infused with love for the promise that comes when women sing together."
- "Creating Personal Mandalas" Holly Hogue, Presenter. Mandalas can help guide our meditation. Holly, along with Geneva Fry and Kris Philips, will show participants how to create their own mandalas using symbols and designs that are special to each person.
- "Urban Walk" Kathy Rogers, Presenter. Kathy will give a guided tour around our historic neighborhood pointing out landmarks and sharing stories.
- "Influential Women of Louisville" Kathie Johnson, Presenter. Kathie will introduce women in our community that have affected local history, culture and politics, but are not as well known.
- Unstructured Activities: Labyrinth walk, creative writing, contemplation and meditation, conversation

By voting to become a Welcoming Congregation, First Unitarian Church agreed to the "Commitments" listed in The Welcoming Congregation Handbook. Commitment # 8 states:

"A Welcoming Congregation seeks to nurture ongoing dialogue between people of different affectional/sexual orientations and gender identifications, and to create deeper trust and sharing."

What action will I take in the coming month to promote civil rights and full inclusion for bisexual, gay, lesbian, and/or transgender people?

- ADVOCACY

**Kentucky Votes Down Anti-Bullying Bill.** In mid-March, a House committee voted down a bill to ban bullying motivated by race, religion, sexual orientation, gender identity, or learning disabilities. Opponents argued that the existing anti-bullying law provides sufficient safeguards. Parents of students who committed suicide due to bullying argued that current law did not protect their children.

**Maryland Approves Marriage Equality.** In early March, Maryland's governor signed marriage equality legislation. The law is scheduled to take effect in January 2013, making Maryland the eighth state to allow same sex marriages. Opponents have begun repeal efforts in both Maryland and Washington.

**Maine to Vote on Marriage Equality.** This November, Maine voters will decide a ballot initiative to provide marriage licenses to same-sex couples. A favorable vote would overturn a previous voter initiative in 2009 that overturned marriage equality legislation signed into law that same year. If the vote is favorable, Maine would become the first state to approve marriage equality at the ballot box.

**New Jersey Override Attempt.** New Jersey's governor vetoed marriage equality legislation in mid-February. Supporters of the legislation have almost two years to accomplish an override of the veto.

**Lesbian Denied Communion.** A Catholic priest in Maryland denied communion to a woman at her mother's funeral, saying that she sinned by living with a woman. The archdiocese issued a statement that it should have been handled privately and that it is "looking into the incident... and will handle this as a personnel issue." (irishcentral.com)
