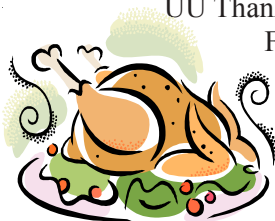

Notes from Norm

It seems like almost everyone I meet in Louisville who is not a regular participant in our church community has been here for something or other over the years. Some have been here before the fire (20 years ago this December), others have been here since the re-building and still others have been here both before and after the fire. To a large extent this is the case because of the diverse individuals and organizations that use our space but who are not formally connected to our church.

For instance, on a recent Saturday we hosted the charter meeting of the Kentuckiana Association of Negro Musicians [KANM]. KANM is the local branch of the historic National Association of Negro Musicians which “is the oldest organization dedicated to the preservation, encouragement and advocacy of all genres of the music of African-Americans in the world.” KANM President Dr. Charlie Mitchell and I are exploring possible future working relationships between KANM and First Unitarian.

Later on that same Saturday, our church was the host for the wedding of a same-sex couple who chose First Unitarian because of the beauty of our sanctuary as well as the “inner beauty of a faith community” like ours, where they knew they would be welcome. As you might imagine, the visitors to our sanctuary on that beautiful fall day covered a wide spectrum of the greater Louisville community and beyond. If they couldn’t before, when you or I meet them somewhere now they will be able to say, “Oh, I’ve been to First Unitarian.” And, as you might also imagine, **John Durham**, our surrogate host made sure that they left with fond memories of their time spent here.

Flood Relief Efforts: We have finally been told that we will be assigned an evacuee family to work with as they establish a transitional


home here in Metro Louisville. By the time you read this, a list of what we will need to help our adopted family get for their new home will be available. Review the list and consider what you can contribute or what you would be willing to get for the family. If you have not already contributed to the church’s FLOOD RELIEF FUND you can still write a check and get it to the church office. Be sure to write FLOOD RELIEF FUND in the memo line. The Fund will aid our adopted family, hurricane victims in the Gulf Coast and our Partner Church in Transylvania.

I want to call your attention to two special services coming up in the next few weeks. October 30 is our Day of the Dead Celebration - El Dia de los Muertos. We invite you to bring a memento of anyone whom you have loved and who has died. Two weeks later, on November 13, the **Rev. Keith Kron** from the UUA Office of Gay, Lesbian, Bi-Sexual and Transgender Concerns will be our guest preacher for an inter-generational service for our whole family.

New Member Welcoming: November 13 will also be our next New Member Welcoming Service. If you have been planning to sign our Membership Book but haven’t done so yet please see me or one of our Board Members to make arrangements to sign and be welcomed into membership on the 13th.

Finally, thanks to all who worked on, offered items for sale, bid on, or purchased stuff at the new and improved, family-friendly, Service Auction. It was a great success and continues to be our biggest church-wide fund raising event.

REviews

One of the many rewarding pieces of my job as Director of Religious Education is getting to watch all the pieces fall into place. After all the preparation -- recruiting and orienting teaching teams, selecting curricula, preparing materials, looking over lessons - along comes a Sunday morning glimpse of a totally engaged group of children and adults, talking, thinking, questioning and exploring.

Last Sunday morning was full of such moments. Our middle schoolers were preparing for their visit to the "Mindfulness Center," a local Buddhist sangha. Members of our Senior High R.E. class/youth group engaged in a communication exercise and then connected it to how they communicate to themselves and others about their UU faith. Members of the Primary Class went on a scavenger hunt that led them to some wonderful people who help our church run smoothly, **John Durham** and **Linda Givens**. And the Preschoolers explored movement by making and eating some wonderfully wiggly pudding.

If you missed all that, then perhaps you caught a glimpse of our classroom "crime scene investigation:" a classroom taped off with black and yellow "caution" tape, a body outline on the floor, items strewn about - could they be clues to the crime? - and a team of busy investigators, notepads and pencils in hand. What was the crime? Who committed it? What was the motive? Where do the clues lead?

The crime - Abel's slaying at the hands of his brother Cain -- was committed thousands of years ago. But thanks to the genuine involvement of the children and their teachers in making sense of this age-old story, the investigation, the questions, and the exchange of ideas are fresh and alive. Many thanks to R.E. teachers **Jo Ann Dale**, **Kent McDaniel**, and **Carol Uebelhoer** for their terrific work with our 3rd, 4th, and 5th

graders. Here's what Jo Ann has to say about the class:

*The Intermediate Class is having a great semester, enjoying an exploration of Shelter Rock's "Bibleodeon" curriculum. The teachers and students are exceptionally engaged, and we find our Sunday adventures staying with us beyond the classroom. We are fortunate to benefit from a combination of factors - appropriate class size, a curriculum that combines fun with education, teachers who understand one another's skill sets, an efficient and creative RE Assistant (thank you **Barbara Kearley!**), and participants who take seriously their covenant of mutual respect. All third, fourth and fifth graders - whether "regulars" or visitors - are encouraged to come see how much fun we have with stories from the Hebrew and Christian Bibles.*

I hope you'll take Jo Ann up on her invitation to come see our R.E. classes in action. I think you'll agree that First Unitarian Church is a great place to be a kid - or an R.E. teacher, or the DRE!

Sunday services begin at 10:55 a.m.

October 23 *Boundaries and Free Thinkers: "Does Anything go in a UU Church?"* Rev. Norm Stewart, Worship Associate **Kathie Johnson**. It is common for non-UUs to think that we can believe anything we want. Most everything in life has boundaries. How do we view boundaries - as good? or bad? or both? How do we as a faith community negotiate our shared boundaries?

October 30 *El Dia de los Muertos - Day of the Dead Celebration.* Rev. Norm Stewart, Worship Associate **Pat Allison**. As part of our Celebration of the Day of the Dead, our service will present a staged reading of *The Little Prince*. The fox character lets us know "because of the color of wheat" he will never forget the Little Prince (the Little Prince has sandy colored hair). Everyone is invited to bring to the service items that makes them remember someone who has passed away and set those items on the altar. xxxxx xxxxxx and Youth Performing Arts School students will perform the staged reading.
