invites us into deeper, more constant, reverent relationships, and carries forward our heritage of hope and liberation.


Ministry is what we do together as we celebrate triumphs of our human spirit, miracles of birth and life, wonders of devotion and sacrifice.

- expressed gratitude to **Joe Edmiston** for volunteering to become our Assistant Treasurer and taking on the job of preparing payroll for the church for free.
- discussed a draft of a policy for accepting and disposing of church property. We hope to finalize a policy next month.
- received reports from RE, House and Grounds, Council, Personnel and Treasurer.
- considered candidates for the UU MidWest Leadership School in July. We plan to send two current or future leaders of our church to this

Dear First U friends and members:

The Stewardship letters have been mailed, the canvassers have been recruited and trained, the stewardship dinner has been held, and the pledge cards have been distributed.

Now we—as canvassers and pledgers--are down to the real work.

As of March 19, 43 percent of potential pledgers have signed their pledge cards, and 52 percent of our goal has been pledged.

We need to finish the task of pledging our collective financial support for the work of the church for next year. If you have not met with your canvasser or signed your pledge card, please make every effort to do so.

Take time to carefully consider how much you will pledge. Pledges of financial support is a promise to pay for everything from the flowers in the sanctuary and oil to light the chalice when service begins, to the wages of our incredibly hard-working staff, to the printing and postage required to send you *Steepletalk* each month, to the insurance that covers the value of the church and its contents, to the lights and heat that keeps us comfortable on Chalice Night. In other words, your pledge allows us to do the work of the church for ourselves and each other.

When one of our dedicated and well-trained canvassers calls you and asks to meet with you to discuss your pledge for next year, please make every effort to meet with your canvasser and sign the pledge card. If you are a canvasser, please know that the Stewardship committee appreciates your willingness to help and your commitment to First U.

Our Volunteer Spotlight for this month shines on Judy Hetland.

Judy was my first volunteer recruit after I became Shared Ministry Coordinator, and WOW did I find a keeper. Judy works in the office on Mondays and Fridays, and she is the volunteer who copies and assembles the Order of Service every week.

Judy was born in South Dakota but has lived all over the U.S. including New York, California, Florida, and Minnesota. She was raised in the Lutheran tradition, and when she moved to Louisville from Florida about 20 years ago she got involved in Trinity Lutheran Church. At one time she was president of that congregation. She and **J.T.** were the last couple to be married at Trinity. Due to a lack of membership Trinity was sold. After that she stopped going to church altogether.

When asked what she likes about First U, Judy quickly replied that she likes the welcoming attitude of the people at this church. She admires the appreciation of diversity and the acceptance of people regardless of their beliefs that she finds at First U.

As for her office volunteer work, Judy says that she enjoys working with the staff. She also notes that making the commitment to volunteer has helped her feel like she is contributing to the church.

Judy brings to the office a soft, pleasant, calm presence as well as a wonderful sense of humor.
